

PUPIL PREMIUM STATEMENT - JULY 2016

Samuel Rhodes pupils make outstanding progress from their starting points by every measure of outcome which has been validated in the recent Ofsted unannounced behaviour inspection June 2015 and Quality assurance review (Challenge partners November 2015). There are no statistically underperforming groups. All pupils have Education, Health and Care Plans or Statements of special needs and many have multiple disadvantages which mean they have many barriers to learning. The pupil premium is used across the school to reduce school readiness inequity and enable all pupils to reach their potential.

April 2016 - March 2017 Pupil premium funding rationale

Pupil Premium funding allocated: £85,805

- Most pupils receiving pupil premium funding meet at least 2 criteria of disadvantage (as described by Troubled Families /20 Outstanding Special Schools) these include family worklessness and poverty, single parent families, generational special needs, medical conditions, families with mental health issues or addiction and many pupils have severe and complex learning difficulties (38%), including autistic spectrum disorders (33%), Down syndrome (10%) social, emotional and behavioural difficulties, and speech and language impairment (data accurate 19.7.16).
- We will spend the pupil premium allocation on the same interventions as last year due to the measurable impact for these pupils as shown in pupil progress outcomes.
- The next review of the school's pupil premium strategy will be in May 2017 when impact is measured.
